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## **Federal Regulations**

- 23 CFR 450.310 and 314
- Key takeaways
  - MPO board shall consist of:
    - $\ensuremath{\circ}$  local elected officials,
    - $\ensuremath{\circ}$  state officials, and
    - officials from public agencies or operators of major modes of transportation (public transportation providers)
  - Written agreement between the MPO, the state, and providers of public transportation to cooperatively carry out the metropolitan transportation planning process, which includes information on the development of:
    - $\circ$  the LRTP
    - $\circ$  the TIP
    - $\ensuremath{\circ}$  the annual list of obligated projects

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## Themes for Peer MOU Analysis





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## Approach, Limitation, and Constraints

- In 2020, the Boston Region MPO commissioned a report to see how the Boston Region MPO compared to peer agencies. Ten agencies were selected based on size and structure, among other criteria.
  - Seattle, San Francisco, Miami-Dade, Houston-Galveston, New York City, Atlanta, Washington, D.C., and Denver were compared this round.
- This research is not intended to be a comprehensive comparison, but rather an introductory investigation.



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## **High-Level Summary of Findings**

- MOU structure is highly variable. Variation is the rule, not the exception.
- There are a few notable findings.
  - Many MPOs have elected chairs; however, Massachusetts MPOs and NYC's MPO have the state DOT as a standing officer.
  - Many MPOs do not have high levels of RTA engagement or formalized relationships with RTAs in their MOU.



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MPO Governance Structure and Agency Collaboration

- How does MPO organizational structure vary?
  - Many MPOs have elected chairs.
  - MPO board size is highly variable; boards can be as small as nine voting members (NYC) or as large as 37 voting members (Washington, D.C.).
- In available MOU documents, there are mainly oblique references to agency collaboration.



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## **Relationship with RTAs**

- Many peer MPOs have the largest RTA (the analog to the MBTA) as a voting member on the board (for example, Washington, D.C. has WMATA).
  - Beyond that, we are not seeing RTA involvement in decision-making at the level that we are hoping to achieve.
- Several MPOs (NYC, Seattle, and Miami-Dade) designate standing subregion committees.
  - While there are no designated RTA representatives on these, it is possible these committees enable closer collaboration with RTAs.

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## Advisory Councils Across MPOs

- Many MOUs dictate the existence of an advisory council in some form.
  - For some MPOs, the advisory council is a standing advisory committee. For others, they are broken down into issue-based advisory committees.
- The structure of these advisory bodies are varied.



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## **Board Education and Training**

- So far, no formalized agreements regarding board member education have been found.
  - However, we do know that some MPOs invest significant resources in board member education, such as paying to attend conferences or MPO peer exchanges.
