


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Locations of 13 Roadway-Pricing Programs Considered

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What were the MPOs' roles in the case studies?

New York City

NYMTC regional travel model to identify expected effects.

- Modeling tolling rates (regional vehicle-miles traveled, mode shifts, congestion reduction, and diversion effects by tolling scenarios)
- Analyses of potential effects on traffic conditions, transit usage, parking, pedestrians, and bicycle usage



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What were the MPOs' roles in the case studies?

San Francisco

MTC 2035 Transportation Plan evaluated:

- Scenario analyses (congestion strategies, such as express lanes and HOT lanes with express bus enhancements)
- Benefits (congestion and vehicle-miles traveled reductions, greenhouse gas emissions, and crash reduction
- Legislative framework for roles and responsibilities of the key players, use of revenue, and project development processes

Note: MTC operates the Bay Area Express Lanes

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Case Studies: Lessons Learned



Political leadership and legislation are essential



Emphasize engagement focused on environmental justice and underrepresented communities early in process



Show that revenue uses are beneficial, transparent, and linked to transit and active transportation infrastructure improvements



Pair pricing programs with transit and active transportation modes

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Case Studies: Lessons Learned



Focus on goals and benefits rather than revenue with transparency around supporting data



Constantly evaluate the program to maintain the effectiveness of a pricing project



Have adequate and specialized staff

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
